## Report on Progress with Implementing the Strategic Approach for NASCO's Next Steps

At its Twenty-Second Annual Meeting in Vichy, France, the Council reviewed the report of its Working Group on the 'Next Steps for NASCO'. It was recognised that this report contained an extensive range of recommendations and in order to implement these recommendations the Council adopted a 'Strategic Approach' for NASCO's 'Next Steps' (CNL(05)49) which identified decisions for immediate implementation and others requiring further consideration. The latter were referred to a Task Force Chaired by Mr Gudmundur Helgason (Iceland), and the report of its meeting is presented separately as document CNL(06)16. The purpose of this brief report is to summarise progress on those decisions taken by the Council in Vichy which it was agreed should be implemented immediately. This progress is outlined in the attached table. The Council is asked to review this progress and decide whether any further action is required.

Decision	Summary of action taken
Decision 1: The Council will keep its agreements under regular review and adapt them, in the light of new information as to their effectiveness.	The 'Next Steps' Task Force has developed guidelines on the preparation of implementation plans and on reporting on progress. Progress in developing implementation plans will be reviewed at the Twenty-Third Annual Meeting. Reporting on the actions taken in accordance with these plans will commence in 2007 (or possibly 2008 for the focus areas) and in the light of these reports it will be possible to better assess the need for revisions to the agreements. Most NASCO agreements have been developed in the last five years. The Williamsburg Resolution was amended at the Twenty-Second Annual Meeting by the inclusion of the US/Canadian MoU on introductions and transfers, and it may be further amended in the light of the comments from the International Salmon Farmers' Association. The Council will need to continue to review these agreements and adopt them as necessary in the light of feedback from the Parties and improved understanding.
Decision 2: The Council will explore the feasibility of arranging a Ministerial Conference to strengthen the Parties' commitment to the conservation of wild salmon through the NASCO Convention.	The Task Force concluded that it would not be feasible to arrange a Ministerial Conference at present. If, at a later date, a Ministerial Conference was proposed, clear objectives would be needed, e.g. to launch the implementation plans or the SALSEA programme, and the NGOs might be able to play an effective role in influencing participation by Ministers.
Decision 3: The home-water Parties will inform the relevant NASCO Commission of the management measures established or envisaged and their expected effects.	One of the key issues identified in the Strategic Approach with regard to management of salmon fisheries was the need to explore opportunities to improve the fairness and balance in management of distant-water fisheries. The Task Force has proposed that this element of reporting should be included under the annual reporting on the implementation plans, and Denmark (in respect of the Faroe Islands and Greenland) confirmed that this arrangement was adequate to allow it to assess fairness and balance in management of fisheries. When reporting under the implementation plans commences in 2007, this Decision will have been implemented.
Decision 4: The Commissions of NASCO will consider whether regulatory measures for fisheries could be adopted and scientific advice from ICES sought on a biennial or multi-year basis.	The Task Force recognised that it would be beneficial to have multi-year regulatory measures, not least so as to free up some time for Special Sessions. It was noted, however, that successful agreement of multi-year regulatory measures may or may not be accompanied by a reduction in the frequency of scientific advice because of the importance of maintaining the scientific databases and ensuring availability of information on any change in abundance that would require changes to the measure. The Council has asked ICES to provide multi-annual catch advice for the period 2006-2008 and advise on the minimum information needed which would signal a significant change in the previously provided advice for each Commission area. The Standing Scientific Committee has prepared a discussion document on the options to change the request for advice in the event that multi-annual regulatory measures are agreed, CNL(06)12. In the light of discussions by the Commissions on multi-annual regulatory measures, the Council will be able to decide whether it wishes to modify its request for scientific advice.
