

Report of the Seventeenth Annual Meeting of the Finance and Administration Committee of the North Atlantic Salmon Conservation Organization 5 June 2000

Rodd Miramichi River Signature Hotel, Miramichi, Canada

1. Opening of the Meeting

1.1 The Chairman of the Committee, Dr Jean-Pierre Plé (USA), opened the meeting and welcomed delegates from all Contracting Parties to Miramichi. He expressed his appreciation to the Canadian hosts for the arrangements made for the meetings.

2. Adoption of the Agenda

2.1 The Committee adopted its agenda, FAC(00)9 (Annex 1).

3. Election of Officers

3.1 The Committee re-elected Dr Jean-Pierre Plé (USA) as its Chairman and Mr Steinar Hermansen (Norway) as its Vice-Chairman.

4. 1999 Audited Accounts

- 4.1 The Secretary introduced the audited accounts for 1999, FAC(00)3. During the year a surplus of £2,863 was recorded, which will be used to reduce the Parties' contributions to the 2001 budget.
- 4.2 The Committee considered the 1999 audited accounts and recommended that they be adopted by the Council.

5. Review of the Annual Payment to ICES

- 5.1 At its Sixteenth Annual Meeting the Council had adopted a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with ICES which details the services that NASCO can expect from ICES and the financial arrangements. A payment schedule for 1999-2002 was agreed. In signing the MoU the Council had stressed that there was a need for long-term stability at the end of the transition period covered by the present MoU through continuation of a fixed rate payment adjusted only to take account of inflation in Denmark. The Council had also stressed the urgent need to address the issue of timeliness of the advice.
- 5.2 The Secretary reported on the continuing consultations with ICES, FAC(00)4. For the 2000 advice, ICES had made changes to the way that the ACFM worked, with the advice being developed by correspondence. As a result the ACFM report was

available to NASCO delegates about 2-3 weeks earlier than in recent years. The Committee acknowledged the good progress made in relation to timeliness of the advice and asked the Secretary to convey the Committee's appreciation to ICES. The Committee asked that the Secretary continue to liaise with ICES and to stress the need for long-term stability in the payments to ICES since a new basis for these payments will be needed for 2002 and beyond, to be considered by the Committee at its next meeting. The Secretary indicated that he would continue to cooperate with other fishery Commissions on the development of new MoUs with ICES. The Committee agreed that, as a result of the new arrangements for developing the advice by correspondence, a reduction in the costs might be expected, and asked the Secretary to raise this with ICES.

6. Donations to NASCO

- 6.1 The Secretary introduced document FAC(00)5. Over the last twelve months the Secretary had been contacted by a number of organizations wishing to make a donation to NASCO. Under NASCO's Financial Rule 7.2 it is stated that "voluntary contributions offered by non-members may be accepted, subject to agreement by the Council that the purposes of the contributions are consistent with the policies, aims and activities of the Organization". These voluntary contributions are treated as Trust or Special Funds. Similarly, "voluntary contributions above and beyond members' budget contributions may be accepted by the Secretary provided that the purposes for which the contributions are made are consistent with the policies, aims and activities of the Organization".
- 6.2 However, the Secretary noted that the offer of donations raised complicated issues about, for example, the independence of the Organization, how those offering the donations might use NASCO's name, and how they might wish to intervene in NASCO's work. He indicated that he believed it would be unwise to use donations to fund the main work of the Organization but that the Committee might consider if such funds might be accepted in relation to a specific project, for example in relation to education of young people on salmon conservation issues.
- 6.3 The Committee agreed that there was a need to carefully consider the issues raised by the offers of donations to NASCO and asked that the Secretary prepare a background paper including possible draft guidelines detailing the conditions under which such donations might be accepted and possible projects which may be funded by donations. As an interim measure the Committee asked that the Secretary respond to those who have already offered to donate funds thanking them for their interest in the Organization and indicating that NASCO is still developing its policy on this issue. In the meantime, if any donations are sent to NASCO, the Committee agreed that the Secretary should advise the Contacting Parties.

7. Stabilisation Fund

7.1 At its last meeting the Committee had asked that a note be prepared of the level to which the Stabilisation Fund would need to be built to have confidence that the Organization could meet its obligations to its Headquarters property, its tenants and its staff members. The Committee had previously recognised that it is difficult to quantify precisely the obligations, but the Council had agreed that sensible financial

planning would take these obligations into account and that the Stabilisation Fund should be built so that there would be stability in future budgets.

- 7.2 The Secretary introduced document FAC(00)6 which indicated that good progress has been made since the last review in 1996 and that the fund had grown faster than anticipated. The auditors were consulted and had recommended that it would be wise to build the fund to £250,000 by 2003/2004. The Committee agreed that the objective should be to achieve the target level proposed by the auditors by 2003/2004 and to include the sum of £21,000 in the draft 2001 budget. However, the amount to be budgeted in a given year would be agreed annually by the Committee.
- 7.3 In order to allow the fund to grow more rapidly than through budgetary provision alone, the Committee agreed that it would be desirable to allow any budget surplus at the end of the financial year to be credited to the Stabilisation Fund, rather than the present arrangement under which any surplus is credited to the Working Capital Fund or used to offset the contributions by the Parties in subsequent budgets. The Committee therefore agreed to recommend to the Council that the last sentence of Financial Rule 6.3 be modified to read as follows:

"Any surplus above 60,000 pounds sterling shall, unless the Council decides otherwise, be credited to the Stabilisation Fund until the fund has reached 250,000 pounds sterling".

8. Consideration of the 2001 Draft Budget, Schedule of Contributions and 2002 Forecast Budget

- 8.1 The Chairman referred to the Organization's sound financial standing and to the fact that for at least the last ten years there had been annual reductions in real terms in the Organization's budgets. The Secretary introduced the Draft 2001 Budget, FAC(00)7, which represents an increase of about 3.9% in real terms compared to 2000. However, if the payment to the Stabilisation Fund and the increased costs to ICES are excluded the budget represents a reduction in real terms of about 3.3%. Reductions in real terms were proposed in six of the eleven budget heads. The Secretary referred to the reasons for the increases in the other sections. He indicated that some of the increases were beyond his control and others were related to the increasing work of the Organization on issues such as aquaculture.
- 8.2 The Chairman indicated that, in accordance with an earlier decision of the Council, an adjustment had been made to the 2000 contributions by the Parties to take account of differences in the provisional and confirmed 1998 catch statistics.
- 8.3 The Committee agreed to recommend to the Council the adoption of the annexed Draft Budget and Schedule of Contributions (Annex 2).

9. Appointment of Auditors

9.1 The Committee recommended to the Council the appointment of PricewaterhouseCoopers of Queen Street, Edinburgh as auditors for the 2000 accounts. The Committee noted the costs associated with the audit but recognised

that it was desirable to continue to use auditors of high international standing. The Committee asked the Secretary to examine the opportunities for cost savings by obtaining quotes from other international auditing companies based in Edinburgh and by discussion with the present auditors.

10. Any Other Business

- 10.1 The Chairman encouraged the Contracting Parties to make their contributions as early as possible for the next financial year.
- 10.2 The Committee noted that there are other companies and organizations which share the name of NASCO. While it might, therefore, not be possible to protect the use of the name NASCO, there might still be an opportunity to protect the use of the name and logo together. The Secretary was asked to investigate these opportunities under appropriate international laws such as trademark protection.
- 10.3 The Committee expressed appreciation to the Secretariat for the excellent preparations for the meeting and clarity of the documentation, and thanked the Chairman for his work.
- 10.4 A list of participants is given in Annex 3.
